OBJECTIVES for target audience of attending anesthesiologists:

1. The presence or absence of Pre-Emptive Analgesia remains controversial in anesthesia literature. Dr. Grider gives us an inside perspective on this phenomenon which could change the participants practice.
2. With questions about the neurotoxicity of anesthetic agents, Dr. Crosby will explore the evidence and help the participating anesthesiologists understand the effects on children's developing brains from our anesthetic agents.
3. A recent concern among anesthesiologists is the topic of Postoperative Cognitive Dysfunction especially in the geriatric population. An informative discussion regarding this complication will help anesthesiologists avoid precipitating factors.
4. Information technology is becoming an important tool for the practice of anesthesia and all medicine. This audience participation discussion by two knowledgeable information experts will help the participants use this technology more effectively.
5. One new technology which impacts anesthesiologists specifically is the development of new anesthesia machines. The participant will be able to evaluate the pros and cons of each new machine after this lecture.
6. How to initiate the process of selecting electronic anesthesiology record keeping systems is of interest to our participants. Information regarding selection, implementation and caveats to do with training on these systems will be included along with initial and long term IT support planning.
7. Another technology that is available to anesthesiologists is ultrasound. The participant can be involved in an hands-on workshops to learn the basic principles of use of this technology.
8. Three academic anesthesiologists will lead individual discussions of difficult or interesting cases and the management of these cases as learning tools.
